




# **Embracing the informal elements of Twitter**

# Multimodality


- Images of text






- Public acts of collaboration helps everyone






# Best practices for Twitter assignments

Structuring a Social Media Component In a College Class

# Help Students Consider Privacy

- O Discuss community norms and privacy concerns FIRST
  - Recognize legitimate safety concerns for women and students of color in public facing social media, especially on controversial topics
  - O Give students the option of an **anonymous** handle
- Start a new Twitter account specifically for the class
  - O Tailor the user name, photo, and bio for privacy AND maximum effectiveness
  - Curate a follow list particular to the course
  - O More efficient for self-evaluation and faculty assessment
- O NEVER NEVER give grades or protected info back via Twitter

# Minimize Anxiety

- O Be clear with expectations
  - O How many tweets?
  - Twitter conventions versus English class?
  - What makes a "high quality" tweet?
- Concrete instructions (5-10 tweets a week) with broad topic guidelines
  - O Complaints, commiseration, frustration can all be useful


### **Twitter Genre Conventions**

- O Teach Twitter conventions like any other genre
  - Profile pictures, bios = not a bot
  - O Replies on Twitter (@ versus <u>.@)</u>
  - O Threads
  - Quote Tweet versus Retweet
  - Accessibility challenges of multimodal elements (turn on image descriptions)
- Teach lessons on entering existing conversations respectfully
- Emphasize the more you interact, the more you'll get back

# Model Twitter Use for Students

- O Model the digital behavior you want to see
  - Engage with scholars in your field
  - Retweet relevant information for the class – articles, topic ideas
  - Respond to students (office hours!)
  - Livetweet your own reading/writing/work




